The mentor arranges the number of meetings as per the requirement according to issues put forward by the mentees. In meeting the mentor discusses the problems of the mentees and provides a suitable solution with the help of which the institution may be taken required action if any. Such problems and their solutions are maintained as the record in the report containing minuetts of the meeting. A copy of such report is provided to IQAC for the information.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The mechanism of internal assessment followed by the institute is designed by the university and being an affiliated institute, the mechanism is compulsory for the institute. For BSc program it is called CA (continuous assessment) for which 20 of the total marks are given and an independent passing is necessary for the student. It includes two unit-tests and two tutorials for a course in a semester. For BCom program 25 of total marks i.e., 25 marks are allotted for the CA including two tests and two tutorials. For BA program 33 percent of the total marks i.e., 25 marks are allotted for the CA wherein the work includes one test (10 marks), one home assignment (10 marks), and one seminar (5 marks).

The teachers submit the marks obtained in continuous assessment to the examination section from which the data is uploaded online to the university via the link provided. For all programs an independent passing in CA is necessary to pass in the program successfully.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar is prepared by the IQAC of the institution at the beginning of the academic year. Since the institution is affiliated to the Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathawada University, Nanded, the academic calendar of the university is used as the base to prepare the calendar of the institution. The academic calendar includes all the academic activities starting from the dates of the admission, commencement of classes, celebration of the different national festivals, NSS camp, annual social gathering, proposed schedules of the end semester examination, and vacations. At the beginning of the academic year each department in the institution provides the list of the activities to be performed during the academic year to the IQAC. The IQAC prepares the academic calendar including all such activities provided by the departments within the scheduled period according to the university academic calendar. Thus, the academic calendar of the institution includes the curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities to be performed during the academic year for the overall development of the students. The continuous follow up is taken by the principal and IQAC to maintain the schedule of the activities mentioned in the academic calendar. For this purpose, the meetings of the heads of the departments are arranged periodically and the necessary guidelines and suggestions are given for the accomplishment of the activities in academic calendar within the scheduled time. Most of the girl students come from farmer, poor and illiterate family background. In the patriarchal society women become suppressed, handicapped, socially, politically and economically backward. The most of girls becomes very sharp they need some additional knowledge and support other than curriculum for self-independence. The aim of college is to empower each girl towards economic, social and skilled. College initiated some special activities for women like as seminar, workshop and training programs. The Practice: Girl captures every field like medical, engineering and in competitive examination top rank students are girl because of their seniority and regularity. In our college the activity of Women Empowerment as taking the judicial awareness, anti-ragging activities, Women's week celebration, Yoga for women etc. On this occasion of women activities, the expert resource persons delivered the speech in front of girls. This is the most important and moral characteristic of our college in the entire Parbhani district for the stimulation and upliftment of backward girls students. All our college greenery, tree plantation and botanical gardens use waste water from the water filter Plant of Municipal council, Jintur next to our collage. Our college has blocked the waste water from the water filter plant by constructing a small check dam and uses that water for all the trees in the campus. From waste water to reuse of water became one of our distinctive features. The third distinctive characteristic of our collage is the highly educated faculty. Most of our teachers are Ph.D. holders. Our N. S. S unit is very active and energetic and dynamic that has implemented many such schemes for the moral and ethical upliftment and betterment of society. The sports department of our college is very reputed in providing continuous support to students in participating in various University and inter University sports. As a result, more than eighty students achieved various medals in these events. More than eighty percent of our college students get all types of government scholarships and all these scholarships were distributed from time to time after receiving from Government.
